If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. <sup>2</sup> And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. 3 If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

<sup>4</sup>Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant <sup>5</sup> or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; <sup>6</sup> it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. <sup>7</sup> It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all

things, endures all things.

8 Love never ends.

## Gospel Reading: Luke 10: 25-37

<sup>25</sup> Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' 26 He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' 27 He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself.' 28 And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.'

<sup>29</sup> But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' <sup>30</sup> Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. <sup>31</sup> Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. <sup>32</sup> So likewise a Levite,

when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33 But a Samaritan while travelling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. 34 He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. 35 The next day he took out two denarii] gave them to the innkeeper, and said, "Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend." 36 Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?' 37 He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.'

### **Post Communion Prayer**

Holy God, we see your glory in the face of Jesus Christ: may we who are partakers at his table reflect his life in word and deed, that all the world may know his power to change and save. This we ask through Jesus Christ our Lord.

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#### **REFLECTION – Hazel O'Sullivan**

How do you know that someone loves you? It may be things that they say, things they do, it might be the way that they look at you, or maybe they tell you outright 'I love you'.

Someone who I know loves each and every one of you is Jesus. I wonder how you know that <u>Jesus</u> loves you. I don't know if you ever sang it as a child, but there's a song called "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the bible tells me so". So, that's the first way – if you read the bible, it tells a story of how much Jesus loves us. He does this in two ways:

Firstly, we know that Jesus loves us because he came to show us a better way to live our lives. He did this through helping others – in healing them, in teaching them, in being a friend to them. The story of the Good Samaritan is one of the parables that he told to illustrate what this better life should include.

And then, secondly, he died on the cross and rose again for us, which was a really loving thing to do – to die for us, his friends.

After his resurrection the disciples, and all followers of Jesus since, were offered the opportunity to live this kind of life through the power of the Holy Spirit. It can be summarised as loving one another, and Paul explains what this looks like in his letter to the Corinthians. So, let's think a bit more about what living in the power of the Spirit looks like in terms of loving one another?

The first thing to be aware of is that the 'others' that we are asked to love aren't just people who look like we do and who believe the kind of things that we believe in. No, when Jesus asks us to love one another, he means <u>all</u> people. And this might come as a shock to those who were taught that 'same is safe, and different is dangerous'. This did work for many centuries, as people spread out across the world, with different tribes staking out their territory and driving others further and further away. Eventually, however, because the earth is a sphere, our dispersing tribes had to come full circle and encounter one another again. Today we <u>have</u> to find a way to live together on our crowded planet as brothers and sisters in one family of creation.

Paul realised that people aren't different because they're trying to be difficult or evil, but because the Spirit has given them different gifts. The Spirit of God is a team spirit, and our unity is energised when we have diversity. Our societies operate better when they operate on love, not fear.

Of course, love needs to be made specific and not remain a generality. Love needs to be translated into practical, specific, concrete, down to earth actions. Each of us has something to give and much to receive, so the term 'love one another' might, for example, mean replacing prejudice with openness to one another; feeling superior with serving one another; resenting another's good fortune with forgiving one another, being isolated from others with being connected with one another, and replacing hostility with offering hospitality to one another.

We need to do more 'one-anothering', especially with people who seem different to us. The only thing that counts in this world is faith working through love.

So, how do you know that Jesus loves you? Well, we can read about it in the bible, but better than that, we can go out into the world to see it being shared between people in what they say and what they do and, even better than that, we can love others ourselves, showing them that Jesus loves them, and, if you do so, it's quite likely that the love will come flowing back to you too.

In a quiet moment, replay the week just passed in your mind. Ask God to show you people, places and moments in which you were able to see something of his love.

Pray for the places in the world where God's love is difficult to find, including Ukraine and the Middle East where conflict is a part of daily life, Ethiopia and other parts of Africa, once again facing famine. Where there is need, pain, hunger and despair, may there be a new revelation of God's love.

Thank you, Lord, that you never forget anyone. You know our stories and love us throughout our lives.

Lord, may they know the revelation of your healing power.
