Third Sunday of Epiphany

Collect

God of all mercy, your Son proclaimed good news to the poor, release to the captives, and freedom to the oppressed: anoint us with your Holy Spirit and set all your people free to praise you in Christ our Lord.

First Reading: 1 Samuel 3:1-10

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the LORD under Eli. The word of the LORD was rare in those days; visions were not widespread.

² At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; ³ the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the LORD, where the ark of God was.

⁴Then the LORD called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' and he said, 'Here I am!' ⁵ and ran to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call; lie down again.' So he went and lay down.

⁶The LORD called again, 'Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call, my son; lie down again.' 7 Now Samuel did not yet know the LORD, and the word of the LORD had not vet been revealed to him. 8 The LORD called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.'

Then Eli perceived that the LORD was calling the boy. ⁹ Therefore Eli said to Samuel, 'Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening."' So, Samuel went and lay down in his place.

¹⁰ Now the LORD came and stood there, calling as before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' And Samuel said, 'Speak, for your servant is listening.'

Second Reading: Revelation 5:1-10

Then I saw in the right hand of the one seated on the throne a scroll written on the inside and on the back, sealed with seven seals; ² and I saw a mighty angel proclaiming with a loud voice, 'Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals?' 3 And no one in heaven or on earth or under the earth was able to open the scroll or to look into it. ⁴ And I began to weep bitterly because no one was found worthy to open the scroll or to look into it.

⁵ Then one of the elders said to me, 'Do not weep. See, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals.'

⁶Then I saw between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders a Lamb standing as if it had been slaughtered, having seven horns and seven eyes, which are the

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seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. ⁷ He went and took the scroll from the right hand of the one who was seated on the throne.

⁸ When he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. ⁹ They sing a new song:

'You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and people and nation; ¹⁰ you have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God, and they will reign on earth.'

Gospel Reading: John 1: 43-51

The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, 'Follow me.' 44 Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. ⁴⁵ Philip found Nathanael and said to him, 'We have found him about whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus son of Joseph from Nazareth.' 46 Nathanael said to him, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' Philip said to him, 'Come and see.' ⁴⁷ When Jesus saw Nathanael coming towards him, he said of him, 'Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!'

⁴⁸ Nathanael asked him, 'Where did you come to know me?' Jesus answered, 'I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you.' ⁴⁹ Nathanael replied, 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!' ⁵⁰ Jesus answered, 'Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than these.'

⁵¹ And he said to him, 'Very truly, I tell you, you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man.'

Post Communion Prayer

Almighty Father, whose Son our Saviour Jesus Christ is the light of the world: may your people, illumined by your word and sacraments, shine with the radiance of his glory, that he may be known, worshipped, and obeyed to the ends of the earth; for he is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

REFLECTION – Ken Bryan

Can you remember when Jesus said to you 'Come and follow me'? Was it a very long time ago or more recently? And perhaps through the years it might have been reinforced in some way when you were asking questions.

For me it was over forty years ago when my wife was bringing our young son to church and I was at home wondering what it was all about, not having been brought up in a church-going family. With God's prompting I came along to see what was going on and why people came to church, and He met me here in St. Mary's and I knew this is where I was to be and where I was to grow in faith and live in a welcoming and loving community. There have been moments along the way when I have been questioning if I am in the right place or doing the right thing and God has shown me with various promptings that I am on the right track.

It's sometimes good to look back to when you became a follower of Jesus. It can make you reassess why you are here on a Sunday and how it affects your life throughout the week. After all, we are not here just as a social club even though the community that is here is so important in working together and supporting each other through good times and not so good times. Whether celebrating good news or happy events or coming alongside those who are going through serious difficulties.

We are here to worship and praise God and to hear and to learn from scripture.

Nathanael was called by Jesus to follow him. I expect, like us, God had been prompting him to be open to become a follower. He may well have been a man educated in the scriptures as Philip said to him that they had found the man about whom Moses wrote in the law and also the prophets wrote in the scriptures.

When Philip says that it is Jesus, son of Joseph from Nazareth, Nathanael was scathing in his remark 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' He obviously knew that Bethlehem was a town of David where the Messiah was to come from. As Micah the prophet had written in chapter 5 verse 2:

² But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days.

But the small town of Nazareth was a different matter - a town of no religious significance. He obviously didn't know that Jesus had been born in Bethlehem.

Philip could possibly have said 'Oh you are probably right, let's forget about it'. But no, the evangelist in him said to him, 'Come and see'. He persisted because he was so convinced that Jesus was someone special, who seemed to know all about everyone he met, saying 'He sees us and knows us'.

Nathanael relents, his curiosity getting the better of him. He follows Philip to meet Jesus who immediately says that he can see that he is a true Israelite and a good and honest man as well. Nathanael is stopped in his tracks at this clear knowledge of himself and asks how Jesus knows him. When Jesus says that he saw him under the fig tree, that may have been a moment when Nathanael was keeping out of the sun while studying the scriptures. Or he may even have been praying for wisdom or guidance from God. And here we have Jesus as the answer to his prayer. That might be why he suddenly believed that Jesus is the Son of God.

In this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity it is good to realise that, as well as ourselves, other people have been called to follow Jesus where they are, and that might mean in a different place in a different church and possibly a different denomination.

How often do our pre-conceived ideas and prejudices get in the way? But that should not be a reason to separate us from them. More a reason to celebrate that they are followers of Jesus where they are.

This should help us as a greater whole to celebrate the good times and be there at the difficult times.

Here in West Wickham, we come together to worship at Easter with the Good Friday service at St Francis', and we also celebrate Christmas with the Big Christmas Sing. And we care for people as the Churches Together with supplies for the Foodbanks, with the Bereavement group, with the Warm Spaces initiative and many other smaller events and acts of kindness which are not limited to our individual churches.

We have more in common than what separates us. After all there are more people outside the church who need to hear God's message and so we should work together. The outside word should not see bickering churches.

As the song written by Burt Bacharach and Hal David goes 'What the world needs now is love sweet love'.

We are not here to spend time saying we are better than you, we won't speak to you or recognise you as a follower of Christ. Surely it is for God to make that decision.

Christian Unity is about listening together, working together and praying together and respecting each other.

Facing the reality of our own brokenness helps to connect us to the suffering of others, here and around the world, from a place of humility and deep empathy.

Jesus sees us and knows us for who we are. And he wants us to follow him, each one of us.

Just as he didn't call one disciple but twelve, and he then sent out many more to spread the word that the kingdom of God has come near with his coming to earth.

As our reading from Revelation says of Jesus:

⁹ 'You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and people and nation; ¹⁰ you have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God, and they will reign on earth.'

We know who is worthy. The lamb who was slain. Jesus Christ.

We are the saints from every tribe and language.

We are a kingdom people, and we are here to serve God.

We are to follow Jesus, each one of us. But we are not to do it alone. We are to live in a community of faith but also be open to live alongside and work with other communities of faith. They will not look like us or do what we do but we are all following Jesus and serving God here on earth.
