

Letter from Carol

"Underneath are Everlasting Arms"

Dear Everyone,

Lighting fires, peeling bells, eating chocolate eggs, singing hymns, giving presents, egg hunts and races, newborn lambs, Easter bunnies, feasting and rejoicing; they are all part of Celebrations on Easter day. It is only right that rejoicing should be part of the Easter festival.

The word, 'Easter', is derived from 'Eostre' who was the goddess of spring, and our Christian festival follows the tradition of 'Eostur' or spring festival. For Christians it is the holiest of days as we remember Jesus 'springing' from the tomb, and being resurrected into a new life with God. The festival follows the reflective period of Lent and especially the last week, Holy Week, which leads us up to Jesus's last week in Jerusalem and 'the way to the cross', his crucifixion on Good Friday.

The pain of Good Friday is symbolic of the deep depths of despair: "And being found in appearance as a man, Christ humbled himself and became obedient to death- even death on a cross" (Philippians 2: 7-8)

He was brought into the dark, the cold and lifeless tomb. He suffered not just in the flesh but also in that "inner crucifixion" of heart, mind and spirit. For some the story of that day, of utter darkness, lasts a lifetime and somehow, they never make it to Easter Day. From the psalms though we are comforted for "He made darkness his secret place" (Ps: 18) God is there even in the darkened tomb.

Yet a Calvary stands in many places today. Wherever we are in the world, pain and suffering have carved deep wounds: those wounds in the shape of a cross. We only have to pick up a daily paper or hear the news to be reminded

of the world in pain: from refugees, the troubles in Ukraine, Israel and Palestine, countries affected by climate change and economic downturns as European and world leaders struggle to work out their new relationship with America and the implications of any negotiations with Russia.

What does the Christian say to all this? Where is the hope? For us to experience the joy of Easter and the empty tomb, we first travel to that dark place, to realise that God will be with us through the pain of the world, and is at the very heart of all existence.

When I visited Jerusalem on a Good Friday, my journey ended at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the traditional site of the crucifixion in the heart of the old city. To reach the very place where Jesus died and to visit the tomb, you enter the church, turn right and go up a short flight of stairs, you find yourself in a small chapel. There are icons and lots of candles. Against one wall is an altar standing, it is said, over the exact point where the cross stood. Under the Altar is a small hole in the floor of the chapel. Many pilgrims come here to say their prayers. If you do what most of these pilgrims do, you kneel before the altar, reach beneath it and put your hand through the hole. If you do so, you will find yourself touching the rough hard cold surface of a bare rock. Touching it you have a sense that what lies beneath all our world confusions, contradictions, mixed up lives, is something greater than any of us can imagine but it is something that brings hope.

If we go there we find as Christ did, that "the eternal God is our refuge and underneath are the everlasting arms" (Deuteronomy 33:27) and then we can all sing for joy on Easter Day, that "He lives, He lives! Christ Jesus Lives today, He walks with me, He talks with me along life's narrow way. You ask me how I know he live, He lives within my heart"

This year, celebrate **Easter Now** on **April 20**th and find new life within your heart that can recharge and inspire you for the months to come!


New Season of Lunchtime Concerts

The Bishop of Southwark's Lent Call 2025

4 March 2025

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

During the last year we have heard so much about the mental health and wellbeing of children and young people here in the UK and across the world. There are so many displaced, injured and vulnerable children and young people around the world. Here in the UK, too, we have children who have been traumatised by the after-effects of theCovid-19 pandemic, domestic abuse, family break ups – or simply the oppressions of contemporary society.

As a result, I have chosen this verse from Matthew Chapter 19 as the theme for this year's Lent Call:

'Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs'.

This year, we are concentrating on three projects involving children and young people's mental health and wellbeing. In our own diocese, we are featuring Welcare's CapeAbility schools programme, which works with children in years 3-6 at primary school. In our Link Dioceses in Zimbabwe, we are working with the Anglican Council of Churches of Zimbabwe who want to support orphans who have been harmed by their circumstances, offering psychological care and support and training for those who care for them.

In our Link Diocese of Jerusalem and the Middle East the Princess Basma Centre is working with children and young people who have been traumatised and injured by the recent hostilities between Israel and Gaza. The team there has have set up 'satellite centres' outside of their Centre in Jerusalem to help those who are most in need. In addition to the usual project sheets, this year we are also offering some more information about displaced children and young people and their needs worldwide, as well as prayer ideas for you to use during Lent and beyond. You'll also be able to watch stories direct from our partners and hear about their work in videos that will be shared on our Youtube channel.

I hope that you will encourage your congregations to observe this Lent in a prayerful way so that it deepens faith and refreshes the soul. Lent is a time for us all to focus on all that God has done for us and to pray for guidance as we consider what we should doin response to God's incredible generosity. Please do think and pray about these Lent projects, encourage your congregations and schools to do the same and to consider what they might give to ensure that this vital frontline work can continue.

Once again, the Lent Call materials will all be online in a format that you can download and print for your church and school. Please also direct people to our website (southwark.anglican.org/lentcall) so that people can explore the materials for themselves, as well as find out how to give. There will also be worship and project materials for our schools – which can work for children's groups in parish, too.

I very much hope that our Lent Call will offer a time and opportunity for all of us to pray for young people who are in need, to reflect on their situations and to give whatever we can to support their wellbeing. Details of how to give financially can be found on our website.

Please display and use these materials and encourage those in your churches to pray and to give as part of their Lenten discipline. I hope and pray that, by using the relevant project sheet and by praying each day week they will find new understandings of the plight of many children and young people in our world today and be able to consider their response.


I just adopted a dog from the blacksmith. When we got home, he made a bolt for the door.
