

# LETTER FROM HAZEL

Dear friends,

2022 was a tough year for many. It started with the Russian invasion of Ukraine, leading to a cost-of-living crisis across the world. This came on top of a climate change emergency with continuing in-action from countries who have made pledges to reduce their carbon emissions. 2022 also saw the end of the reign of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, as well as much political uncertainty in this country. In our churches we said goodbye to a number of well-loved members of our community – Carole Hubbard, Cynthia Symes, Julie Bailey, Laurence Smith and recently Tony Goodchild and Barbara Plummer. Many have also been dealing with ill health against a backdrop of long waiting lists and a stretched NHS, and my pastoral conversations have often been challenging as a result.

Jesus Christ came to bring us Good News and promised that those who ask will receive:

'Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. <sup>8</sup> For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened'. (Matthew 7:7-8).


This is a promise that is sometimes difficult to recognise where our prayers seem to go unanswered and, such a situation can lead to a loss of faith. If you've ever felt this way, you are not alone. However, it can be difficult to talk about that loss of faith, especially to a fellow Christian, who you think is likely to counter

it with an example of answered prayer, just to prove that God is able to perform miracles today, as if that would help! That's probably the last thing you want, so you carry on feeling the pain, unable to tell anyone about it.

Our Lent course this year will enable us all to reflect on this. It won't offer answers to prayer, but it might illustrate why some prayers aren't answered. It won't be a situation where you have to bear your soul, but you might want to add your own thoughts to examples given in the groups. I know that it will help us all to understand a bit more about how prayer works. Prayer always works, just not always in the way that we first imagine it will.

The course is based on material from a book "God on Mute" by Pete Greig. You will not need to buy the book to participate. Our sermons over five weeks will give an introduction to each session, so if you do have to miss one, you can gain a sense of what is covered. We are still working out the details of groups, but please watch out for these in the next week or so.

## **Christmas Services**

Last Christmas came during a difficult year, and we hoped that this Christmas more people would be able to come together to celebrate and worship. And so it proved with more people coming to all of our services. As usual the church was festively decorated to lift our spirits.

Our Messy Christmas was attended by seventeen children and with parents, carers and helpers we had a total of forty-one coming together to celebrate. There was a lovely happy atmosphere in the hall for the activities and the story in the church which was followed by a meal. The Carol Service was attended by forty two people and we have had twenty nine livestream views. It was an opportunity to sing many of our favourite carols and listen to the traditional bible readings. The collection was £129.00 which was sent to CRISIS and there were other direct payments made.

A lot of work went into the Christingle Service with many bags provided with Christingles. There were 196 people who filled the church of which more than seventy were children and another forty eight have watched the livestream. The collection of £350.03 was sent to the Children's Society which was double last year's figure. Other payments were made directly to them. With thanks to all who gave money for oranges, sweets, and candles so that all the collection could be sent to the charity without deductions and thanks to all the helpers for their work to make the service such a success.

There were thirty-one people at the Midnight Communion Service and twenty livestream views of the service.

With thanks to all who have been involved in decorating the church and for those who were involved in any way in putting on the services for people to come into church to celebrate Christmas or for them to be able to watch on our livestream.

And a big thank you to Hazel and Richard for all their hard work and for Geoff and the choir who led the joyful singing at all the services. May we have even more people coming to celebrate at St Mary's next Christmas.

## **Eco Church**

Eco Church is an award scheme for churches of all denominations in England and Wales, aimed at encouraging churches to take seriously the need to protect God's world. One of the key themes in the Creation Story in Genesis is that we are called to be stewards of God's creation.

There are three levels of award - Bronze, Silver and Gold – and five areas to which these apply: Community and Global Engagement, Lifestyle, Management of Church Buildings, Management of Church Land, and Worship and Teaching.

Just before Christmas, David Taylor and I settled ourselves in front of a computer screen to see how St Mary's measured up against the criteria listed under these categories.

Community and Global Engagement included such things as whether the church hosted events that enabled local people to engage with local leaders on local environmental issues and being involved with local conservation work. Overall, we struggled to identify areas in which St Mary's was involved, although we did feel that we supported a local informal car sharing scheme – the 8 O'Clockers are good at this. Not surprisingly we scored rather poorly in this category: 22 out of 230 and no award.

Lifestyle saw us do a little better, with the criteria including promoting walking and cycling to church and encouraging church members to limit their waste by adhering to the principles of reduce, reuse, recycle. However, we do encourage a communal Christmas card scheme amongst the congregation, although its take-up was rather patchy this year. St Francis does rather better! This time we scored 34 out of 160, and still no award.

In order to qualify for a Management of Church Buildings award, you have to achieve such things as making year-on-year improvements in energy efficiency, having a metered water supply and collecting rainwater to use on the church premises. But we do have water-saving devices fitted to our toilets — hippos — and we use double-sided printing whenever possible. Consequently, David and I were pleasantly surprised to find we scored 157 out of 450 and gained a Bronze Award.

Management of Church Land required us to meet criteria which included having a regularly stocked birdfeeder and undertaking wildlife surveys on our land. However, we do encourage members of the local community to use church land for contemplation, the Scouts grow fruit and vegetables on our land and we have a bug hotel (if this comes as a surprise to you have a good look to the left of the grounds at the front of the church) thanks to Messy Church. Result: 85 out of 155 and a Silver Award.

And finally, Worship and Teaching. This required us to be addressing such things as having caring for God's earth featuring as a teaching theme in our Church's children's work and hosting guest speakers from environmental organisations such as Christian Aid at least annually (three cheers for the Big Christmas Sing) and having special Sundays relating to caring for God's earth, such as Harvest Festival. This was our strongest area and with 91 out of a 100 we achieved Gold!

But this is only the beginning, because we can reassess our position as often as we like, and now we know what is required and where our weak areas are — Community & Global Engagement and Lifestyle - we can begin to address them. So when you're encouraged to reduce your personal energy consumption (as you're being encouraged at this very moment), to undertake a personal carbon footprint audit and to attend a film evening with an environmental awareness-raising theme, you'll know why.



# 45 years of 'Wittering On' A Journey in Reader Ministry

Last year was the 45<sup>th</sup> anniversary of my licensing as a Reader in Llandaff Cathedral, Cardiff and so I have been reflecting on the whole experience. I have served in four parishes and preached in many other churches both large and small. I started my ministry in St Paul's Church in the Parish of Aberavon, South Wales where I was baptised, confirmed and was an altar server. Sadly, the church congregation dwindled and some years ago it was closed for worship. The St Paul's Centre next door is still thriving as a Job Club and Community Resource Centre which is wonderful as Aberavon is one of the poorest areas in Wales.

When I moved to London in 1979, I was invited to become a Reader in St Philip, Norbury – the church at the top of the road I lived in. I joined a team of three other Readers (one of whom was more Welsh than I am!) and spent 9 years in ministry there. Croydon was in Canterbury Diocese at the time so I had, and still have, a Canterbury License signed and sealed by Archbishop Robert Runcie. (Coupled with my Welsh Certificate of Admission it probably makes me totally illegal!!) St Philip's has a wonderful choir who are very famous. They have made many records, appeared on TV, and toured the world under the name of 'Libera.' Needless to say, they quickly discovered that I am the only Welshman who can't sing, and I was banned from leading the responses for Sung Evensong!!

In 1981, I married Rowena (not in St Philip's but in Putney Methodist Church) and we moved to South Norwood in 1982. Our two boys, Rhys and Gareth, went to St Mark's Church of England School in South Norwood and, to my surprise, I was poached by the Vicar of St Mark's, Philip Thrower, becoming a Reader there in 1988. I don't know what the transfer fee was, but I didn't receive a penny!! In 1993, we moved to our present home in Shirley, but carried on worshipping at St Mark's. We still have many good friends there.

Those from St Francis will remember Terry Hawkins, Sheila's husband. Terry used to be a churchwarden at St Mark's. Terry and Sheila had moved to West Wickham and started attending St Francis. They persuaded (pestered!) Rowena and I to come to Christmas Midnight Mass in 2003. We enjoyed the worship and fellowship at St Francis and so became members of the congregation. My License was transferred there in 2004 – the same year that Rowena was commissioned as a Southwark Pastoral Auxiliary. Interestingly, I am only licensed to St Francis – not to the United Benefice.

I still have most of the sermons I have preached over the years. There have been some interesting preaching experiences! Here are just a few:

## The Very First One

I had to pass written and practical exams to become a Reader. Yes, it was tough to make it as a Reader in Wales! The last part of the process was to preach a sermon for the examining chaplain in an empty church in Penarth near Cardiff. The church had no sound system and the examiner was hiding behind a pillar making notes. My sermon was based on the Beatles song 'All You Need is Love'. I have read it many times since and can't believe the naivety of some of the things I wrote. Still, the examining chaplain thought it was just about good enough so it was agreed that I should be licensed. I think Llandaff Diocese must have been desperate for Readers that year!

## The One with the Stripper

When I was at St Philip's we also used to preach at Queen's Hospital Chapel in Croydon. This was a hospital for the elderly. During one of my sermons a lady started stripping off. I could see what was happening out of the corner of my eye but carried on gamely. She got down to her bra before a nurse pounced on her and covered her up. No one has stripped off during a sermon since – at least not yet ..........

## The One off the back of a Lorry

Churches Together in South Norwood had a Good Friday service outside Barclay's Bank in the High Street. They invited me to preach on the back of the lorry that had transported the worship group. I had to compete with the very noisy generator on the lorry providing the power for the sound system. If that wasn't enough of a problem, during my sermon a lady fainted off and needed first aid treatment. I think I must have bored her into submission.

Now that I have reached the ripe old age of 70 at Christmastime, I am no longer on the Southwark Diocese 'Active Readers List' and so I have to ask Hazel's consent for me to continue my ministry with 'Permission to Officiate (PTO)'. I look forward to sharing God's Word with you all in the future and enjoying the fellowship of St Francis' and St Mary's – if that's OK with Hazel!!

## **The Peace Candle**

On Remembrance Sunday last year at St Francis', Brian introduced a Peace Candle in his talk, and he explains this below:

Most people when asked what they really wish for in the world, will say 'world peace.' Christians are often known as 'people of the light' – we are meant to reflect the light of Christ amongst our families, our friends, our work colleagues, our community, and our world. That light brings peace. This is a deep peace that the world alone cannot give, but we can spread it to the world.

What does it mean to 'bring light'? Some American tourists visiting Russia were leaving a church when a woman approached and gave them a coin. "Please, use this money to buy a candle and light it in the name of peace," she said. The tourists did as the woman asked and on their return home the candle was lit in their church and has been lit at every subsequent service as a reminder that we are people of peace. If an unknown Russian woman could give their church a simple candle and challenge them to pray for peace, why shouldn't they give candles to their friends in other churches and challenge them to pray for peace. So, they did and in giving away the candles they told the story of the Russian woman. They also challenged churches to give a candle to another church or churches and ask them to do the The movement spread around the world and peace candles are now lit in churches around the UK and in Australia, Fiji, Palestine, South Africa, USA, and other places.

During the Remembrance Sunday service at St Francis, our own special peace candle was lit to remind us to pray for, and to bring that deep peace that passes all understanding. The candle is now lit at every service. During communion services, it is lit at the time of passing the peace which seems very appropriate.

Lord Jesus Christ, who brought peace by the shedding of your own blood, grant us peace in our hearts; inspire us to be peacemakers, and give us courage to face the pain of the world with hope; that peace and justice may triumph everywhere. Amen.

## St Andrew's Church, Gweru

For some years, now, our two churches have been linked with St Andrew's Church in Gweru, a high density suburb in the Central Diocese of Zimbabwe. During that time, St Andrew's has had a number of incumbents, including Ignatius Makumbe, who is now the Diocesan Bishop. After his promotion, we lost contact with the parish, but at the end of last year, the Archdeacon of Reigate was part of a small group to visit Zimbabwe and she kindly offered to take with her any correspondence to the Zimbabwe churches that their link churches cared to send. Joyce Taylor, a member of St Francis, now resident in Coloma Care Home, who has known Bishop Ignatius for some time, sent him a small gift, and I sent a letter for the new priest in charge of St Andrew's, Father Sebastian Meso.

To my delight, shortly after Christmas, I received an email from Fr Meso, telling us about himself and updating us on what is happening in his parish.

Fr Meso joined St Andrew's at the start of 2021 as a deacon, becoming a priest later that year and taking over the parish from Revd R Chikuyo. Things were difficult at that time as the country was only gradually coming out of COVID-19 restrictions. People were still in fear of the disease and few were brave enough to attend Sunday services. Fr Meso continued:

"All I can say, God has been wonderful so far. The aftermath of COVID-19 is still with us. Our Sunday service attendance is growing gradually as some people were still restricting themselves as were the restrictions. We also

have our mid-week services every Wednesday. During Lent we have services everyday and this year we were studying the book of Acts."

Although the parish is blessed with a mixed age range, the majority are not working: some are pensioners, on very small pensions and some are not employed. Those gainfully employed are civil servants. However, the number of groups, or guilds, active within the parish and the numbers involved, were it not a sin, would make one very envious: the Mothers' Union numbers 100, with a further 21 members of the Anglican Women's Fellowship and 30 in the Anglican Church Men's group; the St Agnes' Guild has 20 members and St Peter's 10 (I have no more information about these groups, but will try to find out more). Then there are 45 young people being catered for and a Child Ministry of 60.

Fr Meso adds that they are currently constructing their Rectory! At the time of writing, they were on slab level, with plans to construct the ablution block once the Rectory is finished.

## The email concludes:

"I really need both your spiritual and physical support Rev Fr Richard, because it is my prayer that God opens doors for us to finish building our Rectory around this time next year 2023.

Thanks for starting the ball rolling, we keep in touch. Be blessed."




