

## LETTER FROM HAZEL

#### Dear friends,

Each week at the end of our service of communion, people are sent out with the words 'Go in peace to love and serve the Lord'. Having listened to and worshipped God in the service, he is then sending us out into the world to carry out his work or mission. This model of firstly listening to God (or spending time with Jesus), and then being involved in mission, indicates what it is to be a Christian – you cannot do one without the other:

- Taking part in church and community-based activities without spending time with Jesus is good, but it's not Christ-like. Jesus himself spent time in prayer to give himself spiritual sustenance for the teaching and healing that he did. Without that time with God our activities will be what we want to do, rather than what God has in mind.
- Likewise, just coming to church on a Sunday and having one's own prayer time, without taking that faith into the community, your family or the workplace, is to be very insular and not Christlike at all.

It's like breathing – you have to breathe in and breathe out to stay alive. You have to take in God's word and go out on God's mission to remain a Christian. In all his letters to the early churches St Paul never told them that their task was to increase their numbers, but they were told to live as Christians (i.e., be like Christ).

At our recent APCM meetings, I talked about how we might bring more of a balance to our Martha and Mary characteristics in life. If you remember, in the bible passage (Luke 10: 38-42), Martha rushes around to prepare food and possibly places for Jesus and his friends to stay, while her sister, Mary, sits at Jesus' feet listening to what he has to say. Both the resting and the working are necessary in life, but it can be difficult to strike the right balance, as anyone who has struggled with finding an appropriate work/life balance will know.

I don't always get it right myself, but I am constantly trying to change the balance in what I do. I'd like to share with you something of my sabbatical to illustrate this. I gained much learning about living a contemplative life and have seen benefits arising from living in this way since that time. I have set a date to do this in early June – see page 7.

Living as a Christian is not easy - living a life of faith outside the church buildings is not something we talk about much. There needs to be a balance between time with those from the churches, time with God and time with other friends and family. Finding a greater connection between what happens on a Sunday morning and what happens during the rest of the week might help us in achieving our Vision to have an abundant life connected to Jesus through compassion, community, commerce and congregation.

I have started to speak of some of the connections between this vision and what is happening in our community and West Wickham in my pew sheet messages. I hope that this will give pointers about where we are partnering with God in his mission when we are sent out after the service on a Sunday morning, so making us a kingdom-centred culture rather than a church-centred one.

# Coronation Weekend 6<sup>th</sup> - 8<sup>th</sup> May

After many months of intense preparation, organisation discussions and rehearsing every detail the Coronation Day arrived. The Mall was packed with thousands of people from all walks of life, from several days beforehand, new friendships were formed, and old ones renewed. There was an air of excitement and anticipation of the imminent parade. Eventually the procession started followed by the coach

carrying the King and Queen and was greeted by loud cheers and applause.

Westminster Abbey was opened very early in order that the many guests could be seated in good time. They enjoyed some beautiful music and the choristers while they waited.

On arrival at The Abbey, the King was greeted by many dignitaries. He processed slowly along the aisle where he was greeted by a confident young choirboy. The Service was full of Pageantry and historical procedures dating back several centuries. Leaders from many Faiths took part in the Service, including a Gospel Choir. After the Crowning, Prince William, Prince of Wales, vowed allegiance to his father. During the Service the theme was that the King was coming to serve rather than be served.

The return journey to the Palace with Princess Anne, Gold Stick in Waiting, riding behind the King's coach, and the Royal Children waving enthusiastically to the crowds received rapturous cheers from the crowds in spite of the wet weather. The crowd surged down the Mall to see the 'Working Royals' on the balcony and waited for the Red Arrows fly past in perfect formation as usual.

Sunday was a beautiful day ideal for the Palace Lunch which was attended by invited guests. Some had tickets, but many were chosen for their Community Service. The evening Concert at Windsor contained something for everyone, music, drama, and ballet. It was delightful to see Prince George and Princess Charlotte enjoying the proceedings, while Prince William gave a moving tribute to his father.

Grant that we who live secure in this insecure world, may be generous in caring for our displaced brothers and sisters.



## God on Mute - Lent 2023

Many people in our congregations have been going through really tough times coping with, amongst other issues, bereavement and illness. It led me to explore how we cope with those difficult situations when God seems far away – when our prayers seem to go unanswered. I did an internet search for the phrase 'unanswered prayer' and the first site listed was 'Prayer Course 2 – Unanswered Prayer' and the accompanying book 'God on Mute' by Pete Greig. He is the founder of the organisation 'Prayer 24/7' and, with his wife Sammy, is the pastor of Emmaus Road, a large church with congregations in Guildford, Woking and Aldershot. He wrote 'God on Mute' after a particularly traumatic time in his life when his wife was seriously ill. The course and the book seemed to answer many of my questions about unanswered prayer and so the Ministry Team decided that we would use the course for our Lent Groups and a complementary series of sermons.

We began by looking generally at prayer and why God sometimes seems absent or silent during the storms in our lives. In this introduction it was acknowledged that life is messy – it isn't all plain sailing – even for those with a strong faith. It's OK to have doubts. Indeed, the opposite of faith is not doubt, but certainty. Certainty is missing the point entirely. Faith includes noticing the mess, the emptiness and discomfort, and letting it be there until some light returns.

The other sermons followed Jesus to the cross, embracing themes around Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Day.

#### Maundy Thursday (How I am going to get through this?)

Jesus must have struggled with this thought when he prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane. Yet, he didn't try to avoid it, but surrendered to His Father's will. Jesus wept in the garden and Pete Greig writes that often tears are the best form of prayer.

#### Good Friday (Why have you forsaken me?)

When Jesus uttered his cry of desperation from the cross, there seemed to be no answer, there was no immediate miracle. In this moment Jesus made it plain for all time the need we have for explanation. 'Why is this happening to me? Why does it appear that you have distanced yourself from me? Why have you abandoned me?' Pain, disappointment, confusion or a sense of abandonment cause us to ask God the ultimate question - 'Why?' It is perfectly right that we should ask that most fundamental question 'Why.' 'Why, when I try to do good do bad things happen to me? And often there's no answer to that question, except that God's world is complicated. It's impossible to answer everyone's prayer and his will might be different to ours (often it's much better in the long run). And sometimes our pain might be because we are having to fight with God against the evil one.

#### Holy Saturday (Where is God when Heaven is silent?)

Sometimes, silence is part of God's plan for us. However, in the silence there is still room for prayer. God is still there beside us.

#### Easter Sunday (When will my prayers be answered?)

There are three ways in which our living hope (an answer to unanswered prayer) can come through Christ's resurrection: the understanding that the greater our suffering, the greater our joy; finding something to be thankful for at all times; and using our experience to help others and serve God. Seeing unanswered prayer as an opportunity to experience God with us, or to understand him better, or to gain other blessings through helping others or being supported ourselves through difficult times can reveal an answer to prayer, even if the answer is not the one that we've been praying for.

There's a lovely prayer entitled Silent God by Edwina Gateley that expresses how God doesn't abandon us, but is always near even though we may not be aware of his presence:

This is my prayer — That, though I may not see, I be aware Of the Silent God who stands by me.
That, though I may not feel, I be aware Of the Mighty Love which doggedly follows me.
That, though I may not respond, I be aware That God—my Silent, Mighty God, waits each day.
Quietly, hopefully, persistently.
Waits each day and through each night for me.
For me—alone.






